Friends Of West Earlham Woods

The West **Earlham Woods** has already seen lots of activity this year and **Friends of West Earlham Woods** have been busy making sure that the woods are a beautiful and diverse place for nature to flourish now and for years to come.

In January the group of volunteers went out on a frosty morning and planted 50 Scots pines. The pines came from a local woodland nursery in Felthorpe where they had been grown from seed. Despite the cold this was the best time to transport the trees as they were 'still sleeping' so could be lifted from their bed, moved and planted in their new home without causing too much stress to them.



will not only make the woods look beautiful for years to come, a familiar sight to anyone who has visited the sand dunes around Holkham and Wells, but is great for biodiversity and the climate crisis. The trees were funded by a grant In February, Friends of West from Norwich City Council and the National Lottery. The group planted saplings too: "We planted them amongst brambles to protect them while they are little... we hope they will grow tall and strong for hundreds of years and be delighting people for generations.". Planting the new Scots pines Conservation Volunteers have also planted lots of bare root, broad leaf trees and wood edge trees. At the moment they are tiny and not easily seen, but we can expect them to make a real difference over the next few years.

> Earlham Woods planted bulbs including snowdrops, lily of the valley, wood anemones, wild garlic and bluebells. They spent a couple of significantly sunnier mornings planting the woodland flowers. Lily of the valley is native and its sweet scent attracts pollinating insects. They produce a dense mat of

roots that spread under the ground and maybe, in future years, they will carpet parts of our beautiful woods. The group hope the new plants will do well in West Earlham Woods adding to the sources of nectar for all the inhabitants.

In April, Friends of West Earlham Woods have arranged an early Dawn Chorus walk. The walk is scheduled for 6.00pm on Saturday 9th April and will be led by local expert Peter Walton. The group are meeting at the corner of Enfield Road and Larkman Lane so why not set your alarm and join them. Everybody is welcome.

Later this year there are plans for two new information boards to be installed and it is hoped that the main path through the wood will also be upgraded. Friends of West Earlham Woods hold regular litter picking and conservation sessions on the first Saturday of the month, with some mid-week sessions too. These sessions are very relaxed and friendly, everyone is welcome and all equipment is provided. The centre had been shut during January and February to allow roof repairs to be undertaken. The repairs have now been completed and this means the centre can open its doors once more.

There is a growing programme of activities being delivered at the centre – some provided by Henderson Trust and some provided by other groups. Henderson Trust delivery includes youth activities and

This was a major piece of work so we had to shut for a while but we are now open again and looking forward to developing the centre as a hub for lots of exciting and fun activities".

Animal Angeliea's Rainbow Sanet Encounters

Angelica's Rainbow Sanctuary have launched a new on-site visitors project called **Open The Barn** Door to provide everyone in the community with accessible outdoor activities.

With so many services, clubs and activities having to close their doors during lockdown Open The Barn Door project was created to give the local community an opportunity to get out and active again. The sanctuary offers people of all ages, experience and abilities the chance to get up close and interactive with a surprising array of different animals. Activities include the **Animal Encounter Session** where you can meet, feed, pet and learn how to groom some of the rescued animals. Angelica's Rainbow Sanctuary also now offer Pony Walk Sessions where you can meet Poppy the rescued Shetland Pony, learn how to professionally groom and care for an equine and take her for a walk along Marriots Way.



Animal Encounter Sessions -£20 for 2 people, an extra £3 per extra person, up to 6 people.

Pony Walk Sessions - £25 for 2 people, an extra £4 per extra person, up to 6 people. A discount is applied for charities and not for profit organisations for both of these sessions and block bookings of 4 visits will also receive a 10% discount. In some cases grants can be applied for through external organisations to help with funding these theraputic experiences. Open The Barn Door activities can also be eligible for funding as part of a care package for some young people. IntoUniversity Norwich

IntoUniversity Norwich officially opened its doors in September 2021. **Based in the West Earlham** Community Centre, the organisation works with schools in the area to support young people in achieving their academic aspirations through workshops, one to one support and mentoring.

The Norwich team is made up of five members of staff with different subject backgrounds and specialisms. They run a free after school club called Academic Support for primary students on a Tuesday and Wednesday from 3.30 pm until 5.00 pm and one for secondary students on Monday and Thursday from 4.00 pm until 5.30 pm.

At Academic Support, primary students follow an exciting curriculum exploring different university degree topics. Secondary students use the space to complete homework and revision in a study-friendly environment, receive support with applications for university or work experience and can take part in exciting opportunities like Future Readiness Award.

The centre also has laptops for students to use, as well as access to revision guides and free printing.

Both of these clubs have

available spaces for eligible students to join. IntoUniversity Norwich is also recruiting UEA student mentors and community volunteers to further support the young people they work
