Valley Primary Academy Challenges

Valley Primary Academy know that education is not just about learning inside the classroom.

This year, they have provided pupils with the opportunity to experience specifically chosen, new activities to challenge, enrich and excite their learning journey at Valley Primary Academy. In order to help express themselves, work as a team and develop their self-esteem the Reception children have been taking part in a fun drama lesson each week. These have been Year 2 and Year 3 students brought exciting themes

from minibeasts to fairy tales. Emily, aged 5, said "I love to sing and dance. It makes me really happy". Year 1 students have been learning all about control, respect and discipline through a weekly karate session every Friday afternoon led by a professional instructor. 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Cadge Road Goes Retro

In March Henderson **Trust were** awarded funding from the Youth Investment **Fund and** Children in **Need to refit** the old social club area in **Cadge Road Community** Centre.

The space had remained pretty much unchanged since the social club closed and was not the most inviting space for young people. This is now used for the Trusts' youth projects however so a complete revamp was required.

Graham Meads, who runs the Trusts' Not About the Bike project, was heavily involved in the design of the space. He said, "It was a great project to work on. We had a completely blank canvas and we wanted to totally change the space into something bright and vibrant. From a design point of view we wanted to go for that 'retro' late 80's feel without directly referencing any of the pop culture from the time. Also, we were working on a tight budget and timescale. I think the finished space looks great!".



The area certainly looks very different and the space now has a much more modern feel. The funding also provided a budget for items such as a retro arcade machine, jukebox, sofa, equipment for the kitchen and a selection of board games.

Not About The Bike Lends A Helping Hand

Henderson Trust's charity 'Not About The Bike' (NAB) recently reached out to local organisation to offer Ukrainian Refugee families in our community aid.

Norfolk Polonia runs a weekly 'Ukrainian Support Surgery' drop in every Friday, from 9am to 3pm, at West Earlham Community Centre.

The collaboration enables free access to NAB's after school bicycle group. alongside usual sessions open to anyone aged between 11-16. All bikes donated are thoroughly mechanically checked and often built from scratch. They are also 85% recycled.

The mix of groups acts nicely as an community integration Norfolk Polonia CIC project and reflects the routes of the 'Not About the Bike' project as it was originally started as a means to help socially integrate Asylum Seekers and Refugee families in Norwich about 16 years ago. Meet The Norfolk Youth Parliament

Four Norfolk teenagers have been inaugurated as the county's new Youth **Parliament** Members (YPMs) at a special ceremony at **Norfolk County** Council.

The new YPMs, who competed against 26 other Norfolk candidates for their seats, will now spend two years in office.

Sarah Barrett, 15, of Hethersett Academy – new YPM for Norwich and South Norfolk

Passionate about equality and environmental issues, Sarah campaigned for improving mental health support, encouraging plastic-free packaging and solar panels and improving support for

those young people facing childhood poverty. She said "I'm very honoured to have been elected as the South Norfolk and Norwich Youth Parliament representative. I owe a huge thank you to everyone who voted for me. I look forward to being a voice for other 11-18 year olds and to tackle important issues we as a generation currently face." Euan Duffield, 17, of East Norfolk Sixth Form - new YPM for North, Broadland and **Great Yarmouth** Keen to affect change in the

community, Euan campaigned to improve mental health education in schools, introducing five-minute breaks into hour-long lessons and giving 16-year-olds the right to vote. He said "I am very grateful for the youth of our area with trusting me with the responsibility of representing them and I am looking forward to delivering the changes promised to the young constituents of North, Broadland, and Great Yarmouth."

George Last, 17, of Athena Sixth Form College – new YPM for South West & Mid Norfolk Dedicated and committed to supporting young people, George campaigned to improve awareness of the signs of mental health and removing the stigma of asking for help, attracting better quality apprenticeships and giving 16-year-olds the right to vote. He said "I am honoured to have been chosen by the young people of West & Mid Norfolk to represent their views and I can't wait to get started."

Ewan Harris, 17, of Springwood Sixth Form - new **YPM for North West Norfolk** An aspiring future politician, Ewan campaigned for more resources, more activities and spaces for young people, better mental health services and voting rights for 16-year-olds. He said "As a Youth Parliament Member I hope to make positive change and improve

things for young people in my

area and beyond."

These winning candidates will get the chance to debate in the House of Commons and work with regional MPs and local Norfolk councillors. Councillor Penny Carpenter, chairman of Norfolk County Council, said: "Many congratulations to the four winning candidates and many thanks to all who participated in the youth parliament elections and made your mark ballot this year. This is a brilliant chance for the winning candidates to get the experience of campaigning and representing the young

people of Norfolk locally and nationally and I look forward to working with them and hearing their views." A total of 11,955 votes were cast by 11 to 18-year-olds in Norfolk's YPM elections. Young people also had the chance to cast their votes in the Make Your Mark ballot, which asks them to vote for the issues most important to them from a list of options. This year Health and Wellbeing was voted as the most important issue to young people followed by money, job opportunities and education and learning.
